The Comellus Project



- 2011 2014
- Improving the accessibility of newspapers by electronic deposition
- The pilot renews the newspaper handling process towards a fully digitalised mode: from digital deposition to reception and handling



- Two regional newspaper publishers involved
- Computer Output Microfilm -printing

The Historical Newspaper Library

- http://digi.nationallibrary.fi
- Available for all the users, free of charge
- Volume of the newspapers about two million pages, 1771 1910
- The Library has had legal deposit since 1707
- The National Library partner in the Europeana Newspapers Project

The Development towards the Digital Newspaper Handling Process 1

Now:

 Microfilming of all the Finnish newspapers, delivery to libraries both in Finland and abroad







The Development towards the Digital Newspaper Handling Process 2

Soon:

- Accelerating the handling of newspapers considerably
- Enabling even more high-quality long-term preservation both on microfilm and in a digital format
- A new digital newspaper process including the technical production environment, software and servers



The Digital Deposit System

The newspaper publishers

 The module for the automatic digital deposit of newspapers

The newspaper publishers deliver

- the print-PDF files and
- the associated metadata daily to the Library, including the metadata




Reception

The National Library of Finland

The electronic reception (quality) control system was built in-house

- The features could be implemented fully based on the process workflow
- Agile methodology, gaining from the experiences, comments and feedback of the permanent staff






Computer Output Microfilm (COM)

- The long-term preservation
- The microfilms produced estimated to last at least 500 years
- The microfilming of printed newspapers replaced by the COM conversion in the process
- The optimisation of quality and workflow

The interface

- In the future the newspaper history can be discovered via the same interface: digi.nationallibrary.fi
- Eventually the old digitised newspapers and the digitally deposited newspapers form a digital entity without comparison




The Finances of the Comellus Project
