A M E R I C A.

NEW-YORK, July 4.
WE hear that the Congress have determined to augment their Army to 70 or 75,000, whereof 20,000 are to be stationed here, 10,000 in the Jerseys, and 20,000 to go to Canada.

BOSTON, July 1. The 29th ult. cast anchor in this harbour a Dutch ship of war, of 24 guns, and two French Frigates; two English ships of war were then lying at single anchor, almost at the outside of the harbour, the Captains of which sent on board the foreigners to examine their contents; but they positively denied complying with their request; yesterday they weighed their anchors, and put to sea. Some of the officers who came on shore informed us they were going to Philadelphia, had many letters for the Congress, and cargoes that would by no means be unpleasing to them.

A letter from Philadelphia, dated June 9, says, "The privateers Congress, Capt. M'Story, and Chance, Capt. Allen, who were fitted out here a few weeks ago, are arrived at Egg Harbour; they have taken three ships from Jamaica, bound

General Putnam, who is encamped near New York, has, in his intrenchments, two hundred and twenty pieces of cannon, and seven batteries at several miles distant up the country, surrounded with Indians, in case he shall be compelled to retreat.

It is confidently assured, orders will in a few days, be given for every man of war in the navy, to be put into commission, and that press-warrants will certainly be issued to man them.

So far from Charles-Town having been taken by General Clinton, as mentioned in yesterday's Gazeteer, a correspondent assures us, that he was beaten off with great loss in his attack upon that place. The Ministry know this very well, but like other bad news, they kept it a profound secret, for fear of quite disheartening their deluded party here.

That Charles-Town has not been taken by General Clinton, is evident beyond the least doubt; for if he had succeeded in his attempt upon it, he certainly would not have left so important a conquest, in order to go and join General Howe at Staten Island, where his presence will be of very little consequence. But the truth is, that he met with a severe repulse, in which he suffered a great loss, both of land and sea forces, after which he

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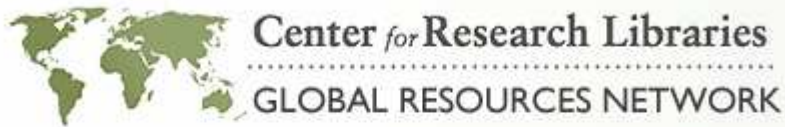

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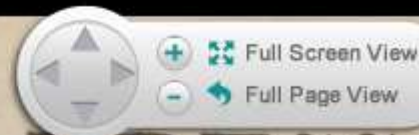

AN ENTERPRISE IN PERSIA.

Ray Thread Factory.

Manufacturing as a factory industry is looked for in Persia; but it is owing cotton thread mill with 1,600 installed at Teheran four years ago by German workmen, and it is working. An outlay of £16,000 was made, and the production (working eleven months) amounts to 35 packets of thread and 10 packets of thread No. 20 (packet which are respectively sold for 16s. (about 6s. 4d. and 7s. 2d.). The company are said to be 17 per cent. This successful venture encouraged the Government to develop the industry, and to build similar buildings in Persia. To this end they have obtained from the British Government conferring on them a monopoly, and propose to work by the aid of European capital. This opinion is generally expressed that the old mill of Teheran and its branches (which had bed) will not be able to put any goods on the market, and will never be able to get from her dependence on foreign capital (especially England) for that article.

THE WILD ANIMALS' DENTIST. The Snake's Tooth and Elephant's Masticator.

The Zoo dentist, says the "Daily News Weekly," is an important official whose patients are very numerous, and also, it must be confessed, very formidable. There are elephants and bears, lions, tigers, and even snakes among them. All animals need to have their teeth examined, filled and extracted. It is exciting work. The Medical Director of the New York Zoological Gardens has been telling tales out of school. One of his patients, or possibly victims would be the more accurate description, was Big Tom, the man-killing elephant. When an examination was made of the elephant's jaw a great hole was made in one of his teeth, and the gum around it was inflamed and swollen to a degree that must have made it very painful. At first it was thought the tooth would have to be drawn, but elephants haven't a great number of teeth, and each tooth is about the size of a man's fist. Besides, it is a matter of great difficulty to get a tooth out, always remembering that the elephant may be inclined to resent the treatment, and, becoming infuriated with pain, go on a rampage at any moment. Therefore, in Tom's case, it was thought best to fill the tooth. Dental instruments such as are used for filling elephants' teeth are huge affairs, and it requires both hands to handle them. Tom was taken out of the elephant house. He was told to sit upon the ground. Slowly the great animal obeyed, until he was almost in a recumbent position. At his keeper's command his great head was lifted, and

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THE ERUPTION OF KRAKATOA.

GREAT TIDAL WAVE.

A telegram from Batavia yesterday says:—The eruption of the Krakatoa volcano, which commenced on the 25th, is of a formidable character. North Bantam is suffering heavily from a dense continuous shower of ashes, mud, and pumice stone, which has almost ruined the crops and orchards, besides damaging the roads and bridges. A tidal wave has swept away the European quarter of Anjer and the Chinese camp at Merak. Telegraphic communication is now interrupted between Bantam and this city. Batavia was in darkness for several hours yesterday owing to the thick rain of ashes proceeding from the volcano. The lower quarters of the city have been swamped by a tidal wave, but the godowns and entrepôts are not damaged.
